As my second term as LSPOA President draws to a close, I will say that it has been a challenging two years. We have continued to provide oversight of the Lodge business, reacting to covid restrictions, staffing issues, participating in obtaining forgivable loans, Lodge upgrades and the daily operations and maintenance. We have held two successful Fisherees and an Independence Day celebration at our lake. It has been an honor to volunteer to serve Lake Sherwood's owners. Of note is the recent visit from our Fire Chief who continuously checks to see that we are safe. This last report indicated that this is the best he has ever seen the lodge. So, kudos to Chuck Donegan (and the Housing Committee) and Michelle for regularly updating and monitoring our lodge for compliance and safety.

Michelle and staff are doing a great job this year. We have had many special events, music and other venues that has added to the enjoyment of the lodge this past summer. The summer was very busy with the closure of Friar Tucks and other restaurants shorting their hours. But mostly I think people were excited about being able to get out and do normal activities like go to the bar or go out to eat.

We have had to shorten the lodge hours and especially our kitchen hours due to the lack of employees to fill the hours we'd like to be open. Also, please remember that these are the people who are working for your relaxation time and it is not their problem that we can't find employees willing to work. They are working as hard as they can so you can enjoy the lodge, good food and beverage. If you are aware of someone who wants to wait or cook, please let Michelle or Morgan know.

We are considering several projects for the near future that will mean the lodge may be closed at some time during the winter, but most likely in February.

To recap, our financials are looking good, we are keeping the lodge safe and enjoyable for all and through the efforts of Michelle and our staff working hard we are staying the course.

Beach Clubs on Lake Sherwood

All off shore Lake Sherwood lots are provided access to the waters of Lake Sherwood in various ways. One of these ways is via subdivision beach clubs. Lots in subdivisions with beach clubs are deeded fractional ownership in such beach clubs. LSPOA has no jurisdiction in the beach clubs.

Questions regarding the above beach clubs, such as placing piers, boat hoists, etc. should be directed to these organizations. For other beach clubs, a list of individuals owning lots in a particular Lake Sherwood subdivision(s) is available from the LSPOA Office. Additional entities may also regulate the beach club shoreline and placement of piers, etc., such as Adams County and DNR.

Muskrat Trappers List

Muskrats are a nuisance and problem on Lake Sherwood. According to the DNR Nuisance Wildlife Guidelines landowners, occupants, and/or agents may at any time without a permit, trap or shoot muskrats that are causing damage to dikes, dams, shoreline, or roadways [NR 12.10(1)(b)1(d)]. A landowner/occupant may solicit an agent to aid in the removal of muskrats when causing damage [NR 12.10(3)(c)]. An agent of the landowner is required to have a valid hunting or trapping license when removing these animals [NR 12.10(3)c, 29.024]. The 2021/22 Wisconsin statewide muskrat trapping season is Oct. 16, 2021 – Feb. 15, 2022.

Muskrats are considered fur bearing animals and their pelts are often valuable. Fall and early winter are excellent trapping times. If you desire to permit a trapper to trap muskrats on your lake front property, below is a list of trappers with their contact information.

Trapping can be done anytime as long as the trapper has permission from the landowner for nuisance removal, and the trapper has a current license. It's preferable to trap in the fall when the hides are worth something and when people tend to be scarcer. There are humane ways to remove muskrats without jeopardizing non-target catches. Trappers are usually well versed with these methods.

OPEN BURNING



Burning solid waste materials, such as treated wood, plastic, household garbage and most other trash is prohibited statewide, and local ordinances may be more stringent than statewide requirements. It is legal to burn items such as leaves, brush and clean wood under some circumstances. However, you need to make sure you have all necessary burn permits. Permit can be obtained at Pritzl's located on HWY 13 and Alpine Drive or online at DNR.

It is always better to use alternative disposal methods, including composting, recycling, and landfills.

Open burning is defined as burning any material outdoors without any air pollution controls in place. Burning in an unconfined area, a container or a pile are all considered to be open burning.

CONSERVATION NEWS

We held our 2021 fall clean-up day at Sherwood Forest on the fourth Saturday of October. Thanks to all who participated. There is some oak remaining that is suitable for home heating or an outdoor fire pit. It will need to be split. Please contact me if you can utilize this wood, as I hate to see it wasted. In our continuing efforts to manage oak wilt and remove dead trees from Sherwood Forest, I have applied for another Wildfire Risk Reduction (Firewise) grant from the DNR for \$1,500 for 2022.

I've had several home owners apply for the \$1,000 Healthy Lakes grants for next year to finance 12 shoreland restorations. This grant funding can cover most to all of the cash outlay for these projects. The Healthy Lakes grants will be offered again for 2023, with an application deadline in October 2022, so please contact me if you have interest. While quite a few owners are making improvements to reduce siltation and nutrient runoff into our lake, there is plenty of opportunity for others to participate, as 25 projects can be funded in each grant cycle.

I have also applied for a DNR Surface Water Education grant for the 14-Mile Watershed Alliance. This grant is capped at \$10,000 and if awarded, will provide funding for water quality outreach to our community and elsewhere in our watershed. The plan is to get information out to our permanent and seasonal residents about what efforts each individual can contribute to help improve our lake.

The 14-Mile Watershed Alliance is continuing with stream and lake testing in the watershed. We are seeking to hire one or more paid interns to assist with the stream testing. It requires about 7 hours, once a month to complete the testing. A high school or college student interested in natural resources would be the perfect candidate. This would be an excellent resume builder for a graduate pursuing a conservation career. Contact me if you or a relative are interested.

The Annual Lake Sherwood Fisheree is scheduled for Saturday, January 15th, 2022. This is the Saturday of the WI DNR Winter Free Fishing Weekend, so all of our community members and Lake Sherwood owners can participate without the need for any fishing license. It is always a good time with a family emphasis. In making our best predictions about the coronavirus and public health advisories, at this point we plan to avoid large crowds in the Lodge and will present awards out on the ice, as we did in 2021. There will be again be youth trophies for largest panfish, while adults compete for cash prizes for largest bass, northern, walleye, and overall largest catch. Last year's largest catch payout was nearly \$1,200. Any profits from this event serve as our annual fundraiser for Lake Sherwood Conservation projects like fish habitat improvements and fish stocking. The raffle is the primary fundraising activity of the day and there will once again be some great prizes. We will need assistance from our Lake Sherwood community in organizing the Fisheree, on the day of the event, in promoting raffle ticket sales, and in participating in the contest. If we have favorable weather and a good turnout, we can expect to raise over \$3,500.

We also plan to continue installing fish sticks for shoreline spawning habitat in the Conservancy Area in January. Last year we put in 70 trees. This winter's goal is for another 50 trees, either along the south shore of the eastern island owned by Adams County, or along the south shore east of the harvester launch, also Adams County property. The island site is preferred, but the final decision will be based on ice conditions in late January. Fresh cut 30' live trees are needed, so if you have any trees that could be cleared in November or December, let me know. We need volunteer participation to continue with this important project. I have secured several thousand dollars in Healthy Lakes and Tri-Lakes funding for our fish sticks, so the cost charged to the LSPOA Conservation Fund is minimal. Most of the LSPOA 25% grant match is the value of our volunteer labor.

We need active volunteers to assist with the many worthwhile conservation activities on Lake Sherwood. You can be a member of the Conservation Committee and improve our community, even if you are not on the LSPOA Board of Directors. Please contact me to offer your help.



Tri-Lakes Management District Fall Newsletter:

Tri-Lakes held their annual meeting on September 4, at the Tri-Lakes office and we covered our results from this year's operations as well as the initiatives we are planning for next year and onward.

This year provided some extreme conditions concerning excessive heat as well as 2 heavy rainfalls with the August 7 rainfall totaling over 50! Both rainfalls sent the heavy algae growth from 14 Mile Creek into Lower Camelot and through the dam into Lake Sherwood. At the meeting we showed before and after pictures from 14 Mile Creek looking east from the 8th Ave Bridge. We are reviewing several companies that we intend to research for some relief of the issues we are faced with.

We have engaged Hey and Associates, a prominent environmental engineering firm, as our experts and advisors going forward. They are in the process of setting up around 20 sediment borings in the 3 lakes as well as 14 Mile Creek this fall. These will help to understand our issues and give us some possible remedies. These borings may also help us qualify for some DNR grants to help fund possible treatment by HAB Aquatic Solutions, a company that specializes in treating lakes with alum to capture phosphorus making it inert and not available to enhance algae and weed growth.

We are also looking at other companies that concentrate on capturing phosphates closer to the sources upstream. Several recent studies have determined that 70 - 80% of our contaminants originate from upstream. We'll check with some of these companies to see if they can be incorporated with the 9 Key Element plan.

We will investigate a smaller remote control harvester that can collect 1,200 lbs of heavy mat algae when it forms due to stagnant water, as well as the accumulation we found in 14 Mile Creek.

We may also test a machine from Calgary Canada that uses a centrifuge to extract algae and bacteria from the water. This machine comes with an extremely high rental cost so we will have to determine its usefulness and cost effectiveness.

We want to thank the attendees allowing us the increase from \$10,000 to \$100,000 for the Lake Management budget. This will allow us to test various products and work towards some interim solutions as we work with the county to move the 9 Key Element Plan forward.

We will be working on the Lake Management plan over the winter with the DNR and Adams County to ensure we have the above new ideas incorporated in the plan.

We had another successful goose roundup this year removing 188 geese from the 3 lakes. We did have 1 E-Coli warning at the Lake Arrowhead beach. This may have been attributable to a few geese that were not captured. We will conduct a goose count each spring to determine our need for a roundup. We want to thank the volunteers who helped in this year's roundup.

The only items allowed to be stored on the property during the off-season are a legally permitted shed, a legally placed deck, two watercrafts (must be owned by the property owner) and a picnic table. All other items must be stored in your shed or removed from the property. Thank you for your cooperation!

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
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
