FROM THE TREASURER



Hello to all our Lake Sherwood Property Owners Association members,

Financially this was just an ok year for the Lodge, and we are going to pay taxes. The big reason for my statement is really due to inflation. We have kept our prices competitive over the year. Cost have gone up on some products significantly. We are monitoring our costs in detail and have started several initiatives to control our purchasing and stay competitive, and yet to keep sufficient inventory to serve our patrons. Our patrons have been the benefactors of this since we have not raised prices significantly in the past year.

In early 2022 we resurfacing our beautiful floor. The resurfacing caused us to be closed for 10 days. The Pavilion was secured for future events late the end of 2022. Look for more improvements on the Pavilion as we move through 2023. We'd like to see this structure become the choice to celebrate weddings, birthdays, anniversaries, and family gatherings; or to just sit and enjoy the lake and the Lodge on the weekend. We are considering several other projects for the near future that will mean the lodge may be closed at some time during the coming year. Thank you for your understanding while we improve the Lodge and our property.

The Independence Day celebration is set for July 1, 2023 with all the normal events, craft fair, kids games, waterski show, food vendors, and culminating with the fireworks and band for the evening. Mark your calendars for the biggest event of the year right here at the lodge.

Donations/dues were slightly down in 2022. I hope you all realize that your donations/dues help support the major events during the year as well as the Lodge improvements. Donations keep the doors open and support the property, building and really any improvements made during the year as well as our many community events, like the Fisheree and the Independence Day Celebration. This year again the Fireworks cost is increasing again so please consider donating to the summer's big event by committing a donation specifically to the Fireworks.

Your donations/dues are key for scholarships for our members and family members who are embarking on college. Each year we paid between \$2,000 and \$4,000 to our members toward their college expenses. Your \$100 can support the continuing education for our members children and grandchildren attending college.

Beach Clubs on Lake Sherwood

All off shore Lake Sherwood lots are provided access to the waters of Lake Sherwood in various ways. One of these ways is via subdivision beach clubs. Lots in subdivisions with beach clubs are deeded fractional ownership in such beach clubs. A few beach clubs have organized owners to regulate use of their beach clubs, others have not. Questions regarding beach clubs, such as

placing piers, boat hoists, etc. should be directed to these organizations. Additional entities may also regulate the beach club shoreline and placement of piers, etc., such as Adams County and DNR.

Lake Sherwood property owners are urged to do the same.

Adams County Beach Club Recommendations

The Adams County Land & Water Conservation Department (LWCD) received a grant from the Wisconsin DNR to survey and create a shoreline protection plan for each beach club located on the Tri Lakes. These beach clubs make up 11% of all waterfront property/shorelines on the lakes. It is the hope of Adams County LWCD that property owners on the Tri Lakes will adopt conservation practices to protect the shoreline and the lakes. Conservation practices are used to protect upland vegetation and slow shoreline erosion to increase the strength and longevity of shorelines. A healthy shoreline that utilizes conservation practices helps increase the water quality and overall health of the lake. The grant received by Adams County LWCD only accounts for the planning of these projects, so there is currently no implementation funding available. However with the plans set, it is much more likely for a beach club to receive additional funding. 2023 LSPOA Scholarships

The Lake Sherwood Property Owners Association is a community organization that works to enhance its community. The Scholarship Program provides an opportunity to assist LSPOA dues paying members, their children/grandchildren to pursue their career goals through education. A minimum of three \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded in 2023.

Scholarship Qualifications:

Individuals who apply for a LSPOA scholarship must:

*Be a dues paying member or a child/grandchild of a dues paying member of the Lake Sherwood Property Owners Association for three (3) years prior to the scholarship application year.

*Intend to be a full-time (12 credits or more) student at a post-secondary school in the fall semester or quarter of 2023.

*Complete the application requirements as noted on the Scholarship Application and submit the application and associated documents by **April 1, 2023** or obtained from the LSPOA Office.

2023 LSPOA Board of Director Nominations and Election

LSPOA By-laws state: One Director should be elected for each of the recorded subdivisions (additions) of Lake Sherwood. Elected Directors shall own property in the subdivision to which he/she is elected. The term of office shall be for one year beginning January 1 and ending December 31. There shall be no limit of successive terms.

Nominees to the 2024 Board, selected by the Nominating Committee, will be presented to the Association Members at the Memorial Day Weekend General Membership Meeting. LSPOA is seeking individuals interested in representing their subdivisions as Directors. If you are interested in becoming a LSPOA Director please email lspoa@wctc.net. The Nominating Committee will add your name to its list of nominees for the subdivision in which you live.

Ballots are developed after the Memorial Day Weekend General Membership Meeting and provided to LSPOA Members in August. Elected Board Members are announced at the Labor Day General Membership Meeting.

2023 Woodland Lutheran Church Rome Community Garden Plots Available

The Woodland Lutheran Church Rome Community Garden has several plots available for the 2023 growing season. The Garden is located on the Woodland Lutheran Church property at 280 14th Avenue. It houses 28 - 4 ft. x 12 ft. raised beds that receive full sun and are protected from pests by a tight wire fence. The Garden received funds from the Rome Town Players which enabled the installation of a drip irrigation system that irrigates each garden automatically. All gardeners need to do is keep fertile soil in their garden, plant, weed, and then harvest their vegetables, herbs, and/or flowers.

The Garden plots are open to all Town of Rome community members. Returning gardeners may register beginning December 1. Until December 30 they retain the right to their last year plot(s). New gardeners who are Woodland Lutheran Church Members may register beginning January 1. New Town of Rome community gardeners may register beginning February 1. There is a limit of one plot per family until May 1, 2023, when open plots become available without restriction. The recommended donation for the use of each 4 x 12 raised bed is \$10 for the 2023 season. The donation is used to maintain the garden area and its irrigation system.

If you are interested in a plot for the 2023 growing season complete the three Garden Registration forms found on the Woodland website at <https://www.woodlandlutheranrome.org/page/community-garden>. Send the completed forms in the timeframe noted above along with your \$10 donation to Woodland Lutheran Church, 280 14th Avenue, Nekoosa, WI 54457. Make checks payable to Woodland Lutheran Church. You may also obtain the forms at Woodland. Check the Woodland website for office hours. If you need the forms emailed to you, have questions, or need additional information contact Laurie Francis, RCG Coordinator, at lfrancis@scacable.com.

The garden plots are on a first come basis. Applicants will be emailed if they receive a plot or if their application went to the waiting list. Waiting list applications and donations will be retained until May 31, 2023. After this date any applications, and associated donations, not assigned a plot will become available for pickup at the Woodland office.



OPEN BURNING		Burning solid waste materials, such as treated wood, plastic, household garbage and most other trash is prohibited statewide, and local ordinances may be more stringent than statewide requirements. It is legal to burn items such as leaves, brush and clean wood under some circumstances. However, you need to make sure you have all necessary burn permits. Permit can be obtained at online DNR. It is always better to use alternative disposal methods, including composting, recycling, and landfills.
	Open burning is defined as burning any material outdoors without any air pollution controls in place. Burning in an unconfined area, a container or a pile are all considered to be open

CONSERVATION NEWS

The Annual Lake Sherwood Fisheree was held on Saturday, January 21st, 2023. The \$100 prizes were awarded for a 32 inch northern, a 17 inch walleye, and a 17¾ inch bass. The largest catch registered was a 32½ inch northern which netted Ken Clemens (pictured) a cash prize of \$1,540. The first place trophy in the youth panfish division was presented for a 9½ inch perch. This is our single annual fundraiser for our Conservation Fund. We made a \$4,300 profit, which mostly is a result of our raffle sales. We completely sold out of our raffle tickets, so we congratulate the prize winners and thank everyone who purchased tickets to support our worthy cause. These funds will be used solely for fish habitat improvement projects and stocking. It is often difficult to get enough dedicated volunteers to make an event like our Fisheree happen, so I want to thank all the volunteers and Lodge staff who made our 2023 event such a success.



As I pen this article, it seems unlikely that we will be able to install the fish sticks shoreline spawning habitat that was scheduled for this winter. Lake ice has not exceeded 9½ inches at our worksite and we need to be able to drive trucks and a tracked skid steer machine on the lake. I will apply for an extension of our grant funding for this project and reschedule for February 2024.

I was notified in mid-February that we were awarded 2023 DNR grants for the Healthy Lakes program for the three Rome Lakes. There are 10 Healthy Lakes practices planned with the DNR 75% share totaling \$10,000. Six of the projects will be on Lake Sherwood properties. In meeting the DNR grant eligibility requirements, I submit the Healthy Lakes grant application through the non-profit 14 Mile Watershed Alliance organization.

The 14 Mile Watershed Alliance is planning another informative State of Our Lakes luncheon for Saturday, June 10th. This year's program is still in the planning stages, but save the date and watch for the agenda to be published on the 14 Mile Watershed Alliance, Town of Rome and Lake Association websites.

As spring approaches, be aware of the posted fire danger and use caution when building campfires or outdoor burning of brush. Following the Firewise program guidelines and Home Ignition Zone recommendations are the best way to protect your property from wildfire threats. In our continuing effort to reduce potential wildfire spread in the Sherwood area, I received a \$3,050 Wildfire Risk Reduction grant from the DNR. This grant supports our efforts to remove standing and down dead fuels in the Sherwood Forest public property plus funds two Firewise projects on private parcels at \$500 each.

We are always on the lookout for active volunteers to assist with the many worthwhile conservation activities on Lake Sherwood. You can be a volunteer or member of the Conservation Committee, even if you are not on the LSPOA Board of Directors. Please contact me to offer your help.

Tri-Lakes Management District Spring 2023

As we mentioned in the last newsletter we reapplied to Solitude for a test to see if we could qualify for alum treatments. They ran their tests August 1 and the results indicate we are good candidates for alum treatments on all 3 lakes. Alum combines with phosphates and makes it inert and no longer a source of nutrients for algae. In later discussions we also found out that the alum will also reduce the effectiveness of certain nitrates. As Lake Sherwood is the oldest lake and has had an algae issue for quite some time we will have the alum treatment applied to the entire lake, including bays and channels. The alum treatment can last up to 8 years and hopefully the nutrients flowing into our lakes will be mitigated. Solitude said we would see an improvement in the condition of Sherwood and we then expect to re-apply for grants for Lake Camelot and Lake Arrowhead for 2024. We are looking for a May or June timeframe for the alum treatment. There will not be any lake closures or warning as alum is non toxic!

Our Tri-Lakes meeting on Wednesday Jan 18, was very productive with discussions of studies performed by our EOR engineers, who found probable hotspots upstream of phosphates and will be conducting additional work and may have some potential remedies to reduce the effects these may have on our lakes.

We are also looking into ultrasound technology to disrupt the algae at the cellular level causing it to sink and it will no longer receive sunlight to grow. We are aggressively being proactive to try and improve the current conditions of our lakes. This is just one of the reasons we engaged EOR, watershed specialists among other areas of expertise, to be our advocate.

We have asked EOR to review Lake Camelot and Lake Arrowhead for aeration treatments and recirculation in the bays and channels to help with algae control. We'll keep you informed.

We are looking for someone to conduct weekly Ecoli tests on our 3 lakes in 12 locations and drive the samples to the lab in Wisconsin Rapids. This is a paid position and the tests will need to be performed early week, Monday ó Wednesday as the lab runs the tests on Thursdays only. Training will be provided. Boating

Wisconsin Boating Laws

The Department of Natural Resources and the Conservation Warden Service invite you to **safely** enjoy the recreational opportunities available on Lake Sherwood. Wisconsin Boating Regulations are available in a printed brochure or online at www.dnr.wi.gov/files/pdf/pubs/1e/1e0301.pdf. Please review the brochure to assure your boating behavior adheres to its regulations. Below are excerpts from this publication to increase the safety of boating on Lake Sherwood and help to reduce the number of citations issued by local and state personnel.



Requirements for Towing Skiers

A person may not be towed behind a vessel between sunset and sunrise. When a vessel is towing a person on water skis, a surfboard, or other device, the operator must have another competent person on board to act as an observer or the vessel must be equipped with a wide-angle rearview mirror. A PWC (Personal Water Craft) operator may not tow a person on water skis or other devices unless:

The PWC is designed and recommended by the manufacturer to accommodate at least three people, **and** a competent observer is on board and in a position to observe the person being towed or the PWC is equipped with a wide-angle rearview mirror. Those towing skiers on water skis, a surfboard, or similar devices and those being towed must act in a safe and prudent manner.

Vessels towing persons may not come within 100 feet of any occupied anchored boat, any PWC, or any marked swimming area or public boat landing.

Persons being towed behind a vessel on water skis, a surfboard, or other device, or their towing rope, may not come within 100 feet of a PWC.



Personal Watercraft Laws & Regulations

PWC operators must obey the laws that apply to other vessels as well as obey additional requirements that apply specifically to the operation of personal watercraft, including registering the watercraft with the state and carrying a B-1 class fire extinguisher on board. The following are additional regulations that must be followed when operating a personal watercraft in Wisconsin.

- Every person on board a PWC must wear a U.S Coast Guard approved Type I, II, III, or V PFD.
- An operator of a PWC equipped with a lanyard-type engine cut-off switch must attach the lanyard to his or her person, clothing, or PFD.
- A PWC must not be operated between sunset and sunrise.
- A PWC operator must always face forward,
- ♦ A PWC may not be operated at faster than slow, no wake speedö within:
 - Within 100 feet of any dock, pier, raft or restricted area on any lake;
 - Within 100 feet of any vessel; or
 - Within 200 feet of shoreline on all lakes, reservoirs, and bays
- ♦ There are minimum age and boater education requirements for operators of PWCs.
A person younger than 12 years may not operate a PWC.

A person 12-15 years may operate a PWC only if he or she has completed a boating safety course that is accepted by the Wisconsin DNR. (Parental supervision is not a substitute for a boating safety course certificate as with other motorboats.)

A person at least 16 years may operate a PWC only if he or she has completed a boating safety course that is accepted by the Wisconsin DNR. A person born before January, 1, 1989, is exempt from the safety course requirement.

- ♦ A PWC must be operated in a responsible manner. Maneuvers that endanger people or property are prohibited, including:
 - Jumping a wake with a PWC within 100 feet of another vessels.
 - Operating within 100 feet of a vessel that is towing a person on water skis, inner tube, wakeboard, or similar device or operating within 100 feet of the tow rope or person being towed.
 - Weaving a PWC through congested waterway traffic
 - Steering toward another object or person in the water and swerving at the last possible moment in order to avoid collision.
 - Chasing, harassing, or disturbing wildfire with a PWC.



Alcohol & Boating Under the Influence (BUI)

Wisconsin law prohibits anyone from operating a motorboat or manipulating water skis or similar devices while under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Alcohol and drugs cause impaired balance, blurred vision poor coordination, impaired judgement and slower reaction times. Anyone who operates or attempts to operate a vessel is deemed to have given consent to an alcohol and/or drug test. It is illegal for a person to operate a motorboat or use water skis, a surfboard or other device if he or she is under the influence of an intoxicant or a controlled substance or has a blood alcohol concentration of .08% or greater.

Adams County ATV/UTV Trails & Road Usage Regulations

Adams County ATV/UTV Trails Open May 1 and Close Oct 31. Adams County has 32 miles of off road ATV/UTV trails. ATV/UTV's are not allowed on snowmobile trails in Adams County. For additional information or an updated ATV/UTV map contact Adams County Trails Department at 608-564-7513.

Road Routes signed for ATV/UTV use in Adams County is typically open year round and regulated by the local municipality via an Ordinance. Each township has its own Regulations. When crossing municipal boundaries you could easily be traveling an approved Road Route onto one that is not. It is the operator's responsibility to know and understand their location and the associated rules and regulations. Citations can be issued for riding on unopened Town, County or State roadways. Township Roads are named like: Fish Lane, Elk Ave, Badger Drive, Akron Court, 13th Lane, 5th Ave; County Highways, are an alpha character like: Z, E, B, N, F, J etc.; and State Highways have numeric characters like 13, 82, 21.


If you ride, please consider joining our club. Applications are available on our website, at club meetings and at various sponsors around Rome.

Individuals operating on vacated trails will cause further trail closings, as generous land owners become upset when their property is abused. Additionally, the Rome Police Department, Adams County Sheriff’s Office, and DNR will cite anyone caught riding illegally. As Chief, I have instructed my officers to have a zero tolerance for ATV/UTV operators caught riding on private property and closed trails.

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
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




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
