
NEWS FROM THE MANAGER CHERYL

CENTRAL WISCONSIN NATURE FOUNDATION IS LOOKING FOR NEW MEMBERS AND VOLUNTEERS

The Central Wisconsin Nature Foundation is looking for new members and willing volunteers. Founded in 2007, the CWNF is a non-profit environmental organization based in the Town of Rome. With 501(3)(c) status, all donations are tax-deductible.

The Mission of the CWNF is to provide natural resources conservation education to the public in interactive hands-on situations. Membership and participation are entirely voluntary.

Popular events presented by the CWNF include its free dinner and movie series held most winters and the annual water walk in September. The dinner and movie series will start this year on February 26 at 6 p.m. at the Rome Town Hall with a showing of *Frogs: the Thin Green Line*. The second movie will be *Plants Behaving Badly* (about carnivorous plants) on March 26. The third movie, shown on April 30, will be *Blue Gold: Global Water Wars*. All the events are free, although donations are accepted.

The Water Walk this year will be held on September 21, 2019, in the Town of Rome, starting at Arrowhead Pavilion, walking to the Twin Lakes Reserve, and returning to Arrowhead Park. Dinner and entertainment will happen after the walk at the Rome Town Hall.

Company for years to provide stewardship at the Twin Lakes Nature Preserve located at 323 County Z. There is a multi-year plan currently in revision to plan for the next 10 years and the CWNF invites new members to participate in modernizing this plan. Currently the site includes about 6 miles of trails, a beach on Petenwell Lake, picnic tables, and a Little Library. Lake Sherwood Property Owners Covenants and Protective Restrictions

The LSPOA Covenants and Protective Restrictions were revised in September, 2018 in accordance with the process outlined in the LSPOA By-laws. These covenants and protective restrictions are legally attached to all Lake Sherwood lots. LSPOA will begin active enforcement of the LSPOA Covenants and Protective Restrictions beginning June 1, 2019. Their purpose is to protect the safety of lot owners, the public, and the environment; the property value of lots and structures; and the ability of owners to enjoy the use of their lots and structures in Lake Sherwood Subdivisions.

Lake Sherwood property owners are urged to review the revised LSPOA Covenants and Protective Restrictions and assure their property is in conformance to its content. A copy of the revised LSPOA Covenants and Protective Restrictions was sent to all Lake Sherwood property owners with the annual LSPOA Dues Invoices in November, 2018 and has been available on the LSPOA website at <https://www.lakesherwoodlodge.com/covenants> since October, 2018.

LSPOA Directors and property owners will be the eyes for covenant infringement identification. Should Lake Sherwood property owners wish to report an infringement, after June 1, 2019 a Lake Sherwood Covenants and Protective Restriction Infringement Form will be available on the LSPOA website and at the LSPOA office. This form must be completed before LSPOA will take action. When an infringement is identified and verified LSPOA action will follow the process outlined in the Covenants and Protective Restrictions which states:

17. Covenants and Protection Restrictions Infringements

17.1 Owners of Lots that contain Lake Sherwood Covenants and Protective Restrictions infringements are subject to legal action by the Association. This action may impose a maximum fine of \$100 for each day of a Covenant and Protective Restrictions infringement. Each day a violation exists shall constitute a separate infraction. The Association shall advise violators in writing, by certified mail, of the nature of the infringement. If the infringement is not resolved or remedied within thirty (30) days from receipt of notification the Board of Directors of the Association may enforce said rules and regulations by legal proceedings, pursuant to Law, in the Adams County Court, Adams County, Wisconsin.

Lake Sherwood Covenants and Protective Restrictions Cite Short Term Rental of Lake Sherwood Properties as an Infringement

The Lake Sherwood Covenants and Protective Restrictions, revised in September, 2018 in accordance with the process outlined in the LSPOA By-laws, cites short term rental as an infringement. Short term rental is defined as the rental of any Lot or Structure on a Lot for fewer than 29 consecutive days for which the owner(s) receives compensation. The excerpt from the Covenants and Protective Restrictions establishing this restriction is below:

4.2 Restricted Uses of All Lots

4.2.1 No Lot or Structure on a Lot shall be used for commercial, agricultural, industrial, or Short-term Rental purposes.

Infringement of Section 4.2 of the Lake Sherwood Covenants and Protective Restrictions may result in action in accordance with Section 17 of the covenants and protective restriction.

****2019 LSPOA Scholarships****

The Lake Sherwood Property Owners Association is a community organization that works to enhance its community. The Scholarship Program provides an opportunity to assist LSPOA dues paying members, their children/grandchildren to pursue their career goals through education. A minimum of three \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded in 2019.

Scholarship Qualifications

Individuals who apply for a LSPOA scholarship must:

Be a dues paying member or a child/grandchild of a dues paying member of the Lake Sherwood Property Owners

Association for three (3) years prior to the scholarship application year.

Intend to be a full-time (12 credits or more) student at a post-secondary school in the fall semester or quarter of 2019.

CONSERVATION NEWS

We had a successful Fisheree on January 19th. The temperatures were cool but bearable with a sunny day. The ice thickness became adequate for vehicle travel just days before our event, so that was welcome.

We had 219 adult entrees and 21 youth. The largest catch was a 29-1/8ö northern, netting a cash prize of \$1,890. The largest bass registered was 19-1/2ö long and the largest walleye was 20-1/4ö in length. The youth entry taking the 1st place trophy was a 9-1/2ö perch.

We made a profit of \$4,000 for our LSPOA fish stocking and conservation fund, so that is a big benefit to our property owners and the public using our waters. The Fisheree also boosts Lodge revenues for that day. I want to express thanks from myself and the Conservation Committee to all of the sponsors, donors, volunteers and Lodge staff who made this event possible. If you have any feedback regarding the Fisheree, please contact me or your LSPOA Board Representative.

During the winter months we have also been very busy installing additional fish sticks habitat along the southeast Sherwood island. As of the writing of this article, it has not yet been completed due to the heavy mid-February snow presenting some challenges, but I anticipate finishing with the 80 trees by early March. The project is valued at nearly \$6,000. It is financed by a \$1,000 contribution by Tri-Lakes Management District and \$2,000 by a DNR Healthy Lakes grant to cover the cash outlay. The remaining value comes from in-kind volunteer hours. This is the second year of a 5-year permit to complete this work. I have applied for another \$2,000 Healthy Lakes grant for 2020 as well as Tri-Lakes contributing funds.

A 2019 Firewise grant of \$1,820 for Sherwood Forest was awarded by the DNR at the full amount I had requested. We are making great progress on the clearing of dead trees and brush with goals for the property being used and enjoyed by our members, while reducing the wildfire hazards to adjacent private parcels. This annual clean-up will once again be on the 4th Saturday of October, so set aside October 26th to volunteer your assistance. The grant dollars are used to finance removal of the piled brush by the Town of Rome and to pay for the use of equipment, such as chainsaws, ATVs, and trailers. The volunteer time is valued at over \$23.00 an hour and is our match for the grant funding. Your participation is important for improving Sherwood Forest as well as continuing our eligibility for matching grant dollars.

The 14-Mile Watershed Joint Committee is holding a lake property owners forum at the Town Hall on June 8th. Plan to attend to get the latest information on water quality issues and the Nine Key Element Plan, which will be instrumental in identifying and funding corrective measures in our watershed. Jerry Wiessinger and I are the Lake Sherwood representatives on that committee. Please look for the 14-Mile Watershed Quarterly Update in this newsletter.

Help Your Neighbors Volunteer Task Force

LSPOA is embarking upon the development of resources to assist Lake Sherwood property owners who are in need of assistance in maintaining their property on Lake Sherwood. Property owners may be unable to maintain their property due to physical disability or limitations, financial restraints, or other valid reasons. These types of property owners might benefit from help from their neighbors. LSPOA would like to develop a Help Your Neighbors Volunteer Task Force of individuals who are willing to lend a hand. Such assistance might include removing debris, performing minor repairs, and other tasks. 14 Mile Creek Watershed Joint Committee – first quarter report 2019

We've just passed the two-year mark as a Town of Rome-wide committee focused on water quality in our area lakes and streams. Under the advisement of DNR's Scott Provost and Adams County Conservationist Wally Sedlar, we first addressed the impact of the 1800 properties around our lakes and the steps needed to reduce our own impact. In addition, we began a comprehensive water quality test program within our lakes and upstream in the watershed. We've recently expanded our test area as a result of high readings in a couple upstream areas from our 15 months of test results.

Application was made for an EPA funded, Adams County administered Nine Key Element Plan, available to watersheds such as ours, influenced by upstream agriculture. It's a formal process of identifying sources of contamination in the 38-mile watershed and allows us to reach out to our upstream neighbors to identify their impact and what we can do jointly to reduce and minimize the nutrients flowing into our watershed.

A.-Background This committee was formed as a result of a citizen motion at the TriLakes annual meeting in 2016. The motion was made to provide funding and create a citizen committee to work towards identifying and fixing the causes of reduced water quality and the increased appearance of blue-green algae in our lakes in the watershed. Committee members from each of the three lakes and Petenwell were identified, along with advisors from Adams County Land and Water Conservation, TriLakes, Town of Rome, and the WDNR.

Taking direction from our advisors, we focused our attention on our own lakes area impact on lake water quality first. Studies show that lakes such as ours with the density of 1800 properties around them can account for 30% or more of the pollutants within. We came to understand that we could not build a bridge with our upstream agriculture neighbors without first identifying and minimizing our own impact on lake water quality. We established programs for soil testing, residential fertilizer reduction, and healthy lakes grants, and we began a program of intensive water testing in the upstream watershed and throughout our lakes and into the culmination at Petenwell. We've held informational forums for our area property owners to help them understand our impact on lake health and the things we all can do to improve it.

We are about to gain approval for our Nine Key Element Plan which is granted to impaired lakes where agriculture is part of the watershed. It's Federal EPA sponsored and state DNR administered with execution by Adams County Land and Water Conservation and the 14 Mile/TriLakes organization. This is a thorough process of analysis of all contributing factors within the watershed, planning for correction, and detailed execution steps. It's the basis for grant funding as well. The testing and work done by the 14 Mile Creek Watershed Joint Committee over the past two years feeds into the nine key element plan and we've been told by our advisors to continue building the data. We've set the date of **April 15th for review of the plan with the DNR representative.**

The 14 Mile Creek Watershed Joint Committee will host a lake property owners forum at **11:00 on June 8th at the Rome Town Hall**. All property owners are invited to attend and learn about residential impacts on lake water quality, the impacts from other watershed sources, and the role of the nine key element plan in identifying, quantifying and minimizing pollution sources throughout the 38 mile watershed. Speaker sessions, information tables and booths, and free lunch for attendees will be provided.

14 Mile Creek Watershed Joint Committee meetings are held monthly at the town hall, and are televised on the local cable channel. All are invited to attend. Meetings are typically held the second Monday of each month at 2:00. We plan to hold a couple meetings on weekends and evenings to provide access to those who work and for those here on weekends.

VOTER'S FORUM

All candidates running for these positions have been invited to participate in the forum. The forum will be held following the guidelines from the League of Women Voters.

There will be box in the receptionist's area of the Rome Town Hall, and also at the Rome Library for voters to submit questions on issues of interest prior to the Forum. The boxes will be set up early in March. Questions must be submitted by **noon on Thursday, March 21st**. In the past, most candidates attended the forum and remained awhile afterwards in order to chat with attendees.

The next election for the Town of Rome will be held on Tuesday, April 2nd. The Poll hours will be 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. In person absentee voting will begin March 13th and end on March 29th at the Clerk/Treasurer's office from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Monday-Friday. The offices to be elected are Justice of the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals Judge District IV, Nekoosa School Board Member, Tri County Area School Board Member, Town Chairperson and two (2) Town Supervisors. Acceptable Photo ID will be required to vote at this election. If you do not have a photo ID, you may obtain a free ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.

OPEN BURNING



.Open burning is defined as burning any material outdoors without any air pollution controls in place. Burning in an unconfined area, a container or a pile are all considered to be open burning.

Burning solid waste materials, such as treated wood, plastic, household garbage and most other trash is prohibited statewide, and local ordinances may be more stringent than statewide requirements. It is legal to burn items such as leaves, brush and clean wood under some circumstances. However, you need to make sure you have all necessary burn permits. Permit can be obtained at Pritzl's located on HWY 13 and Alpine Drive or online at DNR. It is always better to use alternative disposal methods, including composting, recycling, and landfills.

FIRE DEPARTMENT UPDATE

As we put away our snow toys that we (hopefully) finally got some use out of this year, I would like to remind everyone that spring is wildland fire season. Please be sure to follow all of the WI DNR rules for burning, which includes a burning permit for burning and staying on top of fire danger. Use extreme caution when burning brush particularly if the fire danger rises above low. These rules and information about fire danger can be found on the WI DNR website: dnr.wi.gov/topic/ForestFire/.

The Town of Rome is considered a very high-risk area and as Ben Franklin once said "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." With this in mind please perform a *Home Ignition Zone Self-Assessment for Homeowners* from the DNR. In the event of a large wildland fire, Rome has many factors that will exponentially increase the difficulty of preventing harm to property: a large fire load surrounding relatively tightly packed homes and many places with only one way in or out. This makes it crucial that everyone prepares their home and property to give it the best possible chance for survival. If you would like help completing your self-assessment please leave a message with the Rome Fire Department, at 715-325-8015, and we will be happy to assist you.

POLICE DEPARTMENT UPDATE

As Rome's population increases for the summer please be respectful of your neighbors. While we all want to have fun and enjoy our community, we must keep in mind that our neighbors are not far away. In the past we have had problems with noise and especially the discharging of illegal fireworks. The Police Department is attempting to take a proactive approach to the firework problems by eliminating the sale of illegal fireworks in the Town. However, many residents purchase these illegal fireworks from other places and bring the fireworks to Rome to shoot them off. This is not only illegal, but can create a major safety problem for residents and visitors. Therefore, anyone caught discharging illegal fireworks by a Rome Police Officer will have the fireworks confiscated and will face a municipal citation.

PUBLIC WORKS/PARKS UPDATE

Dyracuse Recreational Area will soon start its 37th season! We open for the 2019 season on Saturday, April 6th - *weather permitting*. We have AMA sanctioned race events coming in April, a Grand Prix race held on Saturday, April 27th and a Motocross race held on Sunday, April 28th. ZONING DEPARTMENT UPDATE

CAMPING RULES FOR PROPERTY LOCATED IN THE LAKE DISTRICT (LD)

Generally speaking, lots that are a part of a lake association are included in the LD zoning district.

Camping is allowed on an LD zoned lot that meets the water and sanitary requirements found in the Town of Rome ordinance section 10.11(2)(b)5 from April 14th through November 30th annually. A seasonal camping permit issued by the Town of Rome Zoning Administrator is required. From December 1st until April 14th there shall be no outside storage of personal property except for two watercraft (must be owned by the property owner), one picnic table and a permitted shed and contents per ordinance section 10.11(4)(f)1,2. All other items must be removed from the property until April 14th of the following year.

Failure to comply with the above stated ordinance sections could result in the issuance of a municipal citation. The fine for a Municipal violation is \$250.00 and each day you are in violation can be considered a separate violation.

Please be considerate of your neighbors and respectful of the camping regulations that have been in place and basically unchanged since the lakes were developed.
